



Ashley and Broomhill Community Council Report

This report covers progress we have made in dealing with your priorities for the Ashley and Broomhill Community Council area during the last week in December 2021 up until the end of January 2022.

The report aims to highlight emerging issues in your area, and to provide crime prevention advice and guidance to Community Council members and residents you represent. Our focus is to reduce crime and disorder, help create safer communities and respond effectively to local concerns.

Community Policing Priorities

Antisocial behaviour, Violence and Disorder:

Officers continue to respond to reports of anti-social behaviour across the area, this month with the unseasonably mild weather we have seen a few calls.

On the afternoon of Thursday 24th December officers responded to a call of a male going along Ashvale Place checking letterboxes, it appears to have been a street drinker under the influence of alcohol.

Officers are investigating the damage caused to a garage door on Louisville Avenue that has occurred sometime between Friday 17th December and Friday 7th January. It appears the damage has been caused by a vehicle.

In the small hours of Saturday 8th January officers responded to a male kicking at a door on Nellfield Place, the male had left prior to arrival and on speaking with witnesses appeared to be a drunk male believed looking for his own property. There was no damage and no further calls in relation to the male.

Acquisitive Crime:

On Friday 31st December a motor vehicle was stolen after the property was broken into in the Holburn Road area. A male has been traced, arrested and charged in relation to this.

Sometime between Sunday 14th November and Saturday 8th January a flat on Ashvale Place was broken into and items stolen. Enquiries are ongoing and crime prevention advice has been passed to the resident.

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I encourage everyone to remain vigilant, reporting any suspicious activity. I would rather we get called to a suspicious incident and find it to be a false call with good intent, than not get called and someone has had their property broken into. Remember thieves are opportunistic and will generally target properties in darkness or insecure, by keeping our properties lit and secure we are minimising the (very low) risk of becoming the victim of crime.

Road Safety & Road Crime:

There have been no specific incidents of note in relation to Road Safety / Road Crime.

We continue to work with partners in response to specific complaints in terms of road traffic offences and road safety. Residents in the areas affected by antisocial driving are encouraged to contact Police on 101 at the time, to report incidents and provide as much description as possible of the vehicle(s)/person(s) in order for us to take positive action.

Using this process negates the possibility of the report being missed and also ensures that the caller's details, addresses and telephone numbers are noted for our awareness and response.
